- Analyzed positive, negative, and traumatic transformative effects of language learning based on conceptual investigations and empirical studies on childhood and adulthood attachments
- Developed a rigorous concept of language attachment to understand the connections between attachment behaviors and language learning experiences
- Applied philosophical theory of transformative experience, psychological studies of attachment, and second language learning to analyze and influence language learning experiences in real life
